• Briefly introduced Gray Decision Intelligence – a software tool that helps evaluate markets for new programs. Graduate Council members may have access to this tool.

Proposal: New Graduate Certificate Programs – Engineering Management & Aerospace Engineering Jacob Hochhalter, Mechanical Engineering

Discussion took place about:

- Engineering Management is offered through UOnline, Aerospace Engineering is in-person
- Market analysis was conducted for both certificates
- Collaboration with Utah State University in aerospace engineering resulted in complementary program offerings
- Low cost for department
- Workload for program directors
- Matriculation path from certificate to master's programs
- Outcomes assessment

The following concerns were discussed:

- Statement that the certificate programs are accredited through NWCCU: NWCCU is our institutional accreditor and does not accredit individual programs.
- The proposals indicate that all responsibilities within the programs fall on the directors of the respective MS programs. Are there adequate resources for advising and support?
- Many letters of support are for the MS programs and do not mention the certificate programs. The dean's letter should demonstrate support for the certificates and address concerns about adequate resources for the programs.
- Lack of clarity on the feedback mechanism for learning outcomes assessment. Other than overall grades, there is no data or artifacts being used to assess attainment of specific learning outcomes.
- The current proposal suggests that students who complete the certificate degree program may matriculate into the master's degree program. Admission into a master's program is a separate process, governed by set Graduate Admissions criteria, and earning the certificate does not substitute for application or guarantee admission.
